Grace and peace! I am so grateful for such a joyous and good start as we begin this new season together. From our first worship services to the Installation Service, to the different groups I've been privileged to visit, I am so grateful for these first steps together as your pastor as we enter into the next season of ministry at Congo Pres.

I know that this church, and perhaps each of you, has been in some period of waiting. Maybe it is waiting on news about loved ones, or your health, or just wondering about the next pastor. I bet you're also waiting on what will this church be and do in the future. You're well-suited for this next season of the Church calendar. In December, we will be waiting just a little bit longer, for Advent is the season of waiting on God. As God's people awaited their Messiah (think: "Chosen One"), God showed up in the unexpected, helpless baby born to an unmarried, teenage girl in a little town that wasn't known for much. (As the sarcastic disciple Nathaniel put it: "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" John 1:46)

Advent is that season where God's people remember that as much as we are called to worship, to pray, to serve, to love or to follow, we are called to wait, and to wait for the unexpected. When we start to feel a little restless, or bored, or angry, or whatever comes to the surface when we stay still, in this season we wait. We wait for many things: joy, hope, peace, love. And in this season, we confess that God is the one who gives these (and more), and that the gifts of God cannot be forced. We wait for these things to be given by the God who promises to be with us (Emmanuel), to save us (Savior), to help us (Prince of Peace), and to be faithful to us (the Son of God).

You are a people practiced in waiting, and I now wait with you as your pastor. As these days get darker, we will wait together. We wait until that day when we celebrate that beautiful mystery of God being made human among us in the Incarnation, when curiously, after the light of Christ is born to us, the days start to get a little bit lighter.





During this time of Thanksgiving, I'd like to say a big THANK YOU to all the wonderful volunteers that have helped with all the Fellowship events this year. It wouldn't happen without you!

Blood supplies are typically at their lowest point of the year during the holidays. The need is great, so please consider giving to help save a life at this holiday time.

Dear friends of Literacy for Haiti,

Last May I wrote to you about the horrible conditions in Haiti. I wish I could say that things have improved, but if I did, I would be lying. The government remains both illegitimate and impotent, violent gangs do as they please; committing atrocities daily, and disrupting the flow of all goods, services, and cash throughout the nation. Prices are too high for the very poor to afford what they need.

The United Nations has approved sending in troops to help with stability, under the leadership of the Kenyan government. But this has yet to materialize.

In the meantime LFH does what it always does-jump start commerce with micro loans in the name of Christ, support literacy in our local school, support evangelism on the mountain, and help with medical care for the people God has given to us.



Manno continues to keep all of our ministries operating although he experiences delays and challenges daily. He says he is safe as long as he is in his village high in the improverished mountains where there is very little to interest the gangs. However, he and his family have made a decision.

In good faith, many mountain people like Manno and his wife Dieudimene put confidence in education for their children. The parents sacrificed for many years in order to send all three kids through the rigorous Haitian school system with the hope that they would one day find jobs good enough to support themselves and their extended family. This is a common hope among the mountain people and for some, it has worked out well enough.

But the turmoil of these last several years has cut off that hope. This long term plan cannot succeed in a country where everyone lives in fear because there is no law, order, or safety.

So the family agreed to sacrifice once again and put their hope in immigration for the 3 oldest children. Manno's son Kevin (age mid twenties) and daughter Sophia (age early twenties) and daughter Sophonie (age 14) are now in Mexico trying to follow the immigration process outlined by President Biden, wherein a limited number of asylum seekers from Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua and Venezuela can obtain asylum status visas in the US. Thirty thousand people are permitted to enter the US per month under this program, but millions of people apply. There are no guarantees that these kids will be selected, but we pray they will be.



Bobbi and I, along with my son's family are supporting them in Mexico City as they attempt to navigate this process. There is no telling how long it will take. People in this position are vulnerable. We hope and pray for God's protection upon them. We trust that if and when they arrive in Spokane, we can plug them into the many fine organizations that help people in their situation here in Washington State. LFH and Manno have supported each other for several decades, but we believe the day will come when the financial support for him and his wife will come from these children. May the Lord provide as he always has.

There are some bright spots for this update. One of them is the progress made by the surgery program administered by Dr. Alexi Matousek through Literacy for Haiti Inc. Alexi has trained several Haitian workers to identify mountain people who need surgery, guide them through the confusing hospital process to get it, and follow them up at their homes after the surgeries are completed. The workers use cell phones to send photos of their follow-up visits to Alexi in Spokane. Surgeries are performed at Hospital Albert Schweitzer at the base of our mountain and they are paid for by the social services program at that same Hospital. The health workers are paid through LFH but so far Dr. Alexi himself is the primary donor for this growing project.

The data from this program shows that the health workers are getting more skilled at finding people who need a surgical consultation. And they are guiding many more patients through the surgery process. Before Dr. Alexi began this program surgeries were quite rare in the mountain region where we live.

A second bright spot is church growth. Manno's church is full each Sunday as are many other churches in the mountain regions. People are looking for hope and now many of them are looking in the right place.

In closing let me say that it is getting harder to sustain momentum for all ministries in Haiti. Many organizations have pulled out due to the difficulties. It has not been possible to travel to Haiti to encourage the people there and our routine stops at churches to encourage their support have stopped as a result. Inflation is high in our country and money doesn't buy what it used to only a few months ago. For these and other reasons, financial support for LFH has been waning a bit. Even churches have cut back their giving, some as much as 63% less than what they once gave. I don't blame anyone. It's just the way it is right now.

But I thought it wise to make you aware, because I know that many of you will want to help us meet any shortfall, now that you know there is one.

There has never been a shortage of crises in this world and Haiti has always shouldered more than their fair share. Of course, now is no exception. This could both depress and discourage us, or we can choose to take advantage of the crisis and allow it to make us into what Christ wants us to be, as the passage from Galatians at left reminds us.
